

Incalculable Blackness: Mathematics and Existence

Moderator: Calvin Warren, Associate Professor Department of African American Studies

Continental Philosophy is experiencing a "mathematical turn" in its attempt to formalize Being, avoid the pitfalls of phenomenology/correlationism, and rupture knowledge programs. This "turn", however, neglects antiblackness and reproduces metaphysical violence—since the foundations of mathematics secure oppressive enumeration (such as algorithms) and evacuate blackness from Being itself (such as Hegel's "bad infinity"). These seminars provide a philosophical overview of contemporary "philosophy of mathematics" and its relation to blackness. This investigation, however, is experimental, as a *black* philosophy of mathematics is undeveloped in academia. Thus, we will grapple with philosophical infinity and blackness (via Hegel's calculus); Number theory (via Frege, Badiou, and Black feminism); and Chance/Probability (via W.E.B. Du Bois and Quentin Meillassoux).
