This year's keynote speaker is Deboleena Roy, who holds a double appointment in Neuroscience and Behavioral Biology and in Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies. She recently published the open access digital book Molecular Feminisms: Biology, Becomings, and Life in the Lab, for which she received an Andrew W. Mellon Digital Publishing in the Humanities Fellowship through Emory University. Deftly argued and written for multiple audiences, this book offers a new feminist model of scientific inquiry that responds inventively to the ontological, epistemological, and ethical ramifications of the new feminist technoscience. Prof. Roy will discuss Molecular Feminisms, her ongoing commitment to multi-disciplinarity, and her interest in working at the intersection of digital and public humanities.
